### **Note-Taking Workshops**

In January, note-taking workshops were conducted for MYP learners, facilitated by Ms. Pallavi. The sessions were conducted grade-wise, and lasted for an hour, during which students covered various documented techniques of notetaking. During the workshop Ms. Pallavi emphasized the following points:

- 2. Clearly understand the covered concepts
- Make study notes based on class notes
- 4. Use visual tools to mark the significant points in the notes
- 5. The key to excellence depends the students' attentiveness in class and quality of the notes taken by the students based on the lecture

#### **ACER IBT Exams**

From February 2nd to 4th, the IBT ACER exams were held for MYP 1-3. In the ACER exams, students answered 3 multiple-choice papers – Science, Mathematics, and English.

Owing to the pandemic, this year's IBT (International Benchmark Tests) were held remotely at Indus. Teachers conducted remote invigilation through Microsoft Teams, ensuring that all students gave their exams in a fair manner. Students were each given a username and password, and had to log onto the official website, where only the selected test was active. Students were given one hour to the complete paper, and submitted it on the website itself.

The IBTs are published by the Australian Council for Educational Research, and are a useful tool in tracking academic progress against that of students within the same school, country, and across the globe. The IBTs are administered across grades 3-8, and provide a benchmark, which students can use to improve their academic advancement.

#### **Face-to-Face School**

After almost a year of remote learning, physical school began again from 1st February. The first week, the students came to school using private transport after which the school provided buses. All students who came to school had to provide a negative CoVID test on their first day and, temperature checks were conducted in the mornings as students entered the block.

During the snack break, students were given time to use the washroom, and to eat snacks if they brought some. During the lunch break, from 1:15 to 1:40 pm, the school provided packed lunches, and all students were seated at a distance.

#### **Face-to-Face School**

At the start of the day, before students can even board their buses, the buses are sanitized, with procedures inspired and directed by Apollo Shine Foundation. When the student enters the campus, their temperature is checked twice, once at the gate, and once in the block, after which they are cleared to attend their classes.

During the school day, students follow a schedule different from that of an online student. This is where the teacher has to use two platforms simultaneously. Once school ends, day scholars are once again sent home, in a re-sanitized bus. Boarders, meanwhile, attend all their class in a separate block, ensuring that there is a separation of students. Armbands facilitate this separation.

Face-to-face school started in February, and was a great initiative. Now, at the end of February, rising cases threaten to shut it down. The school just has to wait and watch, as the situation presents itself.
